5.	The phrase suggests that Walter thought he might be in danger and so thought he might have to defend himself with his walking stick. He thought he might have to hit something or someone with his stick. <i>Please give one mark for correct content and one mark for accurate SPaG.</i>	2 marks
6.	Answers could include: 'Moon-bright' Many ghost stories occur at night time. 'Sprung out of the earth.' This could suggest the woman has been buried in the ground and has come out of the ground. 'Dropped from Heaven.' This could suggest the woman is dead and has come down from heaven. 'Solitary' Loneliness is always a key part of ghost stories. 'Dressed from head to foot in white.' This creates imagery of a ghost as ghosts are often shown to be all in white. 'Grave' The adjective suggests graves and this is where dead people are buried. 'Dark cloud' This weather sounds scary and so fits with the idea of a scary ghost story. 'Startled... suddenness' These quotations link to the idea of shock and surprise which often happens when people meet a ghost. 'Apparition' An apparition is another word for ghost. 'Dead of night.' This phrase is connected to ghost stories as it involves both night time and the idea of the dead. 'Lonely place' This sounds like a very scary place for a ghost to appear as no-one else is there. <i>Please give one mark for any appropriate quotation. Please give a second mark for the explanation. However, explanations must be written in complete sentences to be awarded a mark. Must refer to dead, buried, ghosts etc. Do NOT accept if about science fiction or any other sense.</i>	8 marks

Interpretation: Woman is more scared than Walter so don't accept Walter as answer. <i>The students get one mark for an accurate answer and one mark for writing in a proper sentence.</i>	2 marks
