The words in the cartoon are spoken by Stalin, the leader of the USSR. Mao, the leader of China, is loading soldiers into the barrel of a gun.

Adapted from a letter sent by the Soviet Government to the governments of America, Britain, and France, July 1948.

We warned you many times to follow the agreements made by the Four Powers regarding Germany and Berlin. The Soviet Government has now been forced to take measures to protect the interests of the German people and the economy of the Soviet zone. We are concerned about the people of Berlin and are trying to solve the problems about essential supplies. If the situation continues we will not hesitate to supply the whole of Berlin by ourselves.
